### **4.0 SUMMARY OF ACTION ITEMS**

#### **4.6 AAL – Seating for disabled persons in terminal arrival hall**

AAL can do better in this space and new seating will be installed. Temporary seating has been installed. AAL were thanked for actioning this request so quickly. AAL will give an update at a future meeting regarding disability access in the Terminal as a lot of work has been done in this area.

### **5.0 AIRPORT UPDATE**

**5.1 Adelaide Airport Limited (AAL) Report** – Report was tabled with the following items noted: AAL had its busiest day on record with the Ashes and Pacific School Games held in Adelaide in December. The Old International Terminal is being demolished next week. As a result of the demolition, REX arriving passengers will now travel by bus from the aircraft to a new entrance to the main terminal. Passengers can then walk to the Baggage Reclaim Area in the main terminal to collect luggage. There will be no change to REX check-in and departure procedures. The Old International Terminal was opened in 1982 by Prime Minister Malcolm Fraser and Premier David Tonkin. The first international arrival was a Qantas flight enroute to

Melbourne from London and Singapore. The first departure was a Qantas flight going to Auckland.

**5.2 Property and Development and Land Use Report** – The Report was tabled and taken as read.

**5.3 Environment Report** – The Report was tabled and taken as read.

**5.4 Planning Co-ordination Forum Report (PCF)** – Report was tabled with the following items noted: A Committee Member requested a clarification as to the location of the National Self-Storage facilitation area. It was explained that the site was in the Terminals and Business Precinct, located just east of Aldi (not in the Airport East Precinct).

**5.5 Adelaide Airport Technical Working Group (AATWG)** – The Federal Department (DIRD) is going to follow up with Air Work who operate with Toll Priority into Adelaide to look at the operational procedures for pilots so they understand their downwind tolerances.

## **6.0 COMMUNITY AND AIRPORT AGENCY UPDATE REPORTS**

**6.1 Federal Department of Infrastructure and Regional Development** – Report was tabled with the following items noted:

The Department are commencing work around the next Productivity Commission enquiry into the economic regulation of airports. This enquiry will look at the relationship between Airports and Airlines. These relationships have regular ACCC monitoring to ensure equitable outcomes. The Department explained that the enquiry will be similar to the 2010/2011 enquiry with a report completed at the conclusion. The reporting process includes the Minister proposing the findings to the Treasurer which then goes to the Prime Minister. This enquiry will have a large consultation process involving all interested stakeholders.

The last NASAG (National Airports Safeguarding Advisory Group) meeting was held in November 2017. The NASAG groups meets and discusses how to best manage planning on land around airports. Revised guidelines have been proposed to make it clearer for planners for issues such as Public Safety Zones (end of Runways) where guidelines for development of off-airport lands are potentially in a high-risk area and need appropriate long-term land use planning.

The review of Regulations under the Airports Act which are due to expire is underway and work will continue over the next few months to revise and renew the relevant Regulations by April 2019. The Department is redrafting noise regulations including adopting tilt rotor aircraft which Uber are investigating and to include Chapter 14 standards to strengthen noise standards for large international aircraft. This standard (Chapter 14) came into effect 31 December 2017.

Since the last meeting there have been some changes in the Department of Infrastructure and Regional Development. Dr Steven Kennedy is now the Secretary of the Department of Infrastructure and Regional Development, replacing Mr Mike Mrdak.

There were 2 diversions into Adelaide in the last quarter. An Emirates aircraft was given a dispensation but departed after the approved time. The Department has been investigating the apparent breach and assessing the follow up action against Emirates that the Department will take for that breach.

The Department visited Qatar in Sydney last week and undertook a dispensation refresher session.

It was noted that the curfew fact sheet has been created by the Department to assist with complaint management was provided at the last meeting. The Department thanked the City of Adelaide for their feedback. A copy of the fact sheet will be distributed to members with final comments to be provided to the Department.

**6.2 State Department of Planning, Transport and Infrastructure Report** – The Report was tabled and the following was noted: The Marion Road Upgrade Planning Study timeline is to be completed at the end of financial year (June 2018).

DPTI discussed work on planning reform and how to integrate the National Airports Safety Framework and guidelines. The Department are working on a new guideline on Helicopter landing sites. The Chair will organise a presentation on the various guidelines and state planner's local considerations and referral system.

**6.3 Airservices Australia (ASA) Report** – Report was tabled with the following items noted: A comprehensive report on the last quarter of 2017 is available online. There were 19 complainants compared to 24 complainants for the same period last year. The main issues were operations in curfew, helicopters and arrival on Runway 23 and departures on Runway 05. The complaints were from 17 different suburbs. West Beach was the only suburb with more than one complainant (two).

The Chair received an email from a resident who had issues with runway selection and runway use. The Chair forwarded the email to NCIS and NCIS has responded.

**6.7 City of Adelaide** –The Council has agreed to investigate why Civil Aviation authorities were not consulted regarding the City Helipad site. DIRD thanked the council for letting them present on curfew movements and how operations are handled in Adelaide.

The Chair thanked DIRD and ASA for offering re-education process noting there is always room for improvement.

### **7.1 AAL Terminal Expansion Update**

The project design process is ongoing along with a contractor involvement to assist with detailed program and sequence of works. Construction is currently targeted for the second half of the year. The Executive General Manager for Planning and Infrastructure was thanked for keeping this Committee informed and will continue to do so.

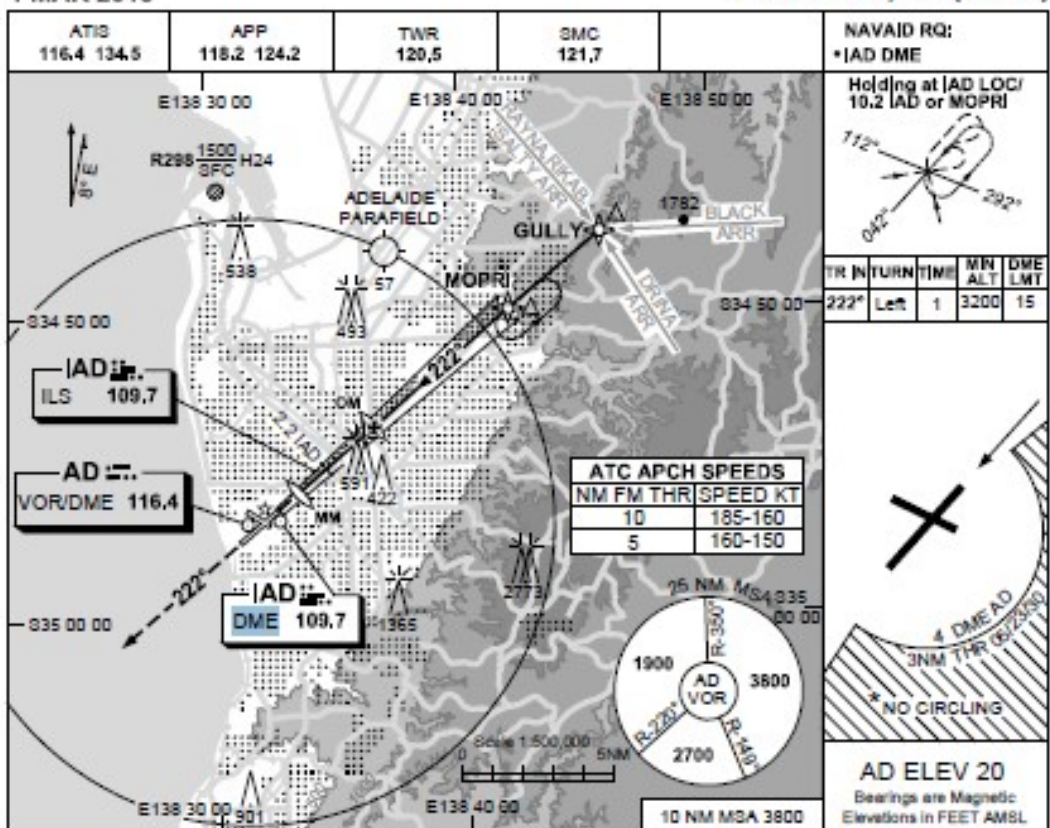
### **7.2 ASA – Approach Charts**

A Committee member asked a question about aircraft landing at Adelaide Airport and the use of two different approach charts. While the chart provided was out of date Airservices presented a detailed explanation with regard to the member's concerns. It was noted that there are several approach chart providers around the world, in Australia Jeppesen Charts are the most commonly used by both International and Domestic carriers. While the method of display varies the data, distances and levels, are the same. The member queried the differences in levels on the charts provided, one produced by Jeppesen and one by Airservices. The reason for the differences were that the charts displayed two different ILS approaches (see current charts below ILS-Y and ILS-Z) using distance measuring equipment (DME) at different locations. One DME is located at the VOR site near Harbour Town, the other is co-located with the ILS near the runway 23 threshold. The distance between the two DME sites (approx 0.8nm) is the reason for different levels, viewed from at a particular ground location the aircraft will be at the same level on both approaches as they pass overhead.

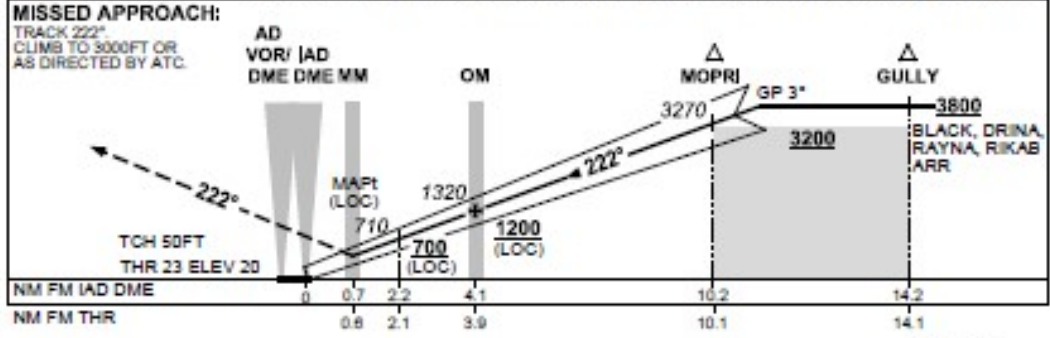

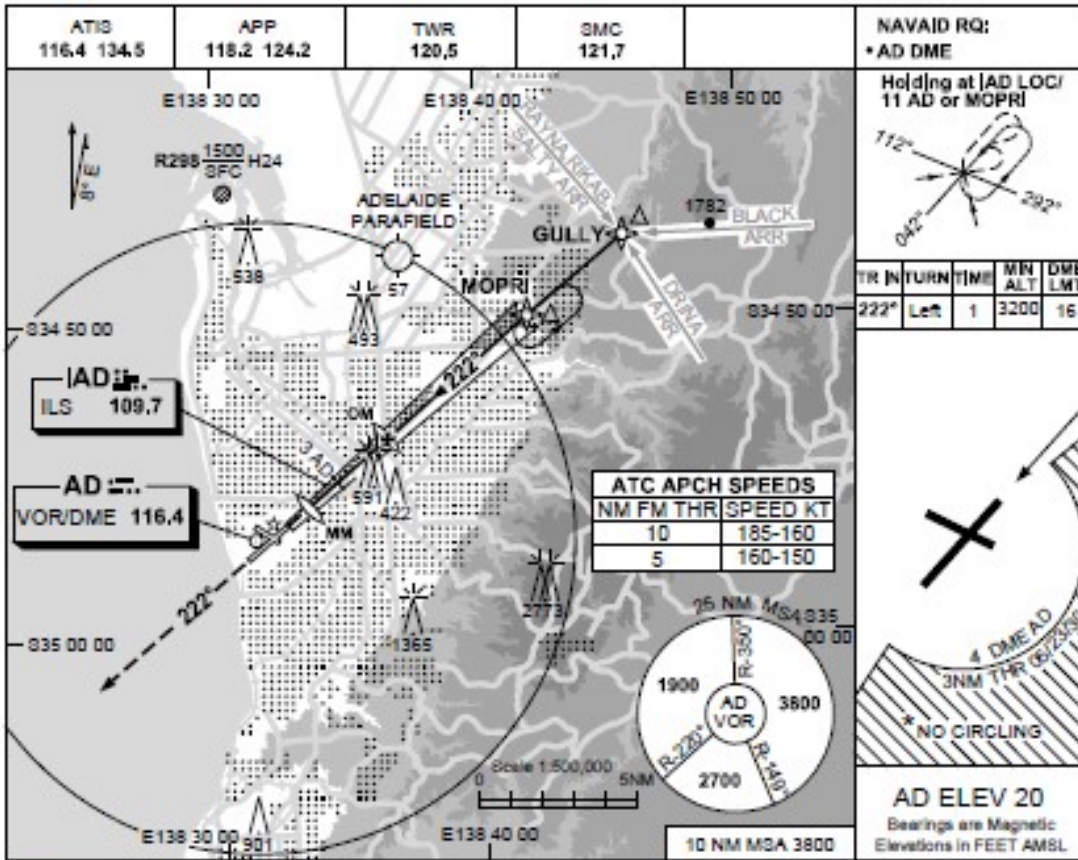

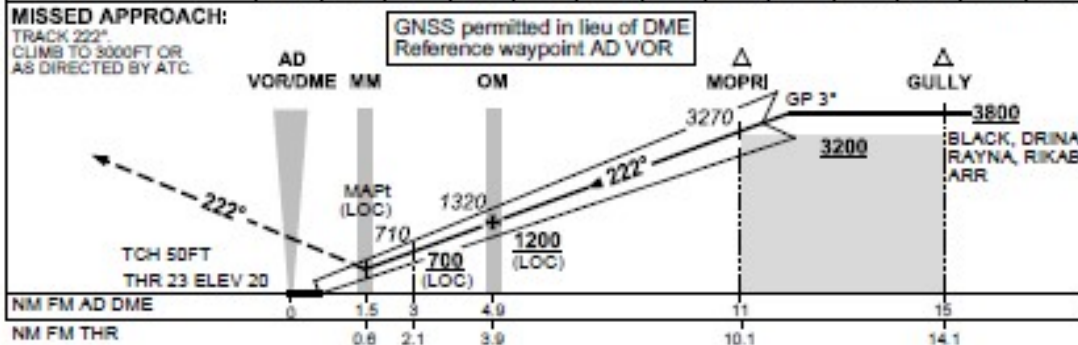
